1. CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

2. PUBLIC COMMENTS ON ITEMS NOT APPEARING ON AGENDA

Ms. Julie Tacker of Los Osos spoke about evaluation of staff positions.

Mr. Jeff Edwards of Los Osos spoke about the County's role in the December 2010 flooding event.

3. CONSENT AGENDA

A. Review and Approval of Minutes of the Meeting of December 5, 2012.

Under public comment, Mr. David Broadwater suggested a revision of the December 5, 2012 minutes to read: "Mr. David Broadwater submitted a letter (Exhibit A) regarding a sewage sludge storage deficiency identified in the U.S. EPA CEI Report and supported and advocated specific measures for its immediate resolution."

Director Ferrara was the only director present at the December 5, 2012 meeting so he approved those minutes as amended, by necessity. Item 3A motion carried 1-0.

- B. Review and Approval of Warrants.
- C. Financial Report ending November 30, 2012

It was moved by Director Ferrara, seconded by Director Peterson, to approve Consent Agenda Items 3B and 3C, as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

4. PLANT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Plant Superintendent Barlogio presented the results for December so far which show that the Plant is within compliance.

FRM has replaced the drive and the catwalk on the No. 1 Primary Clarifier. Staff has installed the rebuilt No. 1 influent pump, and it is back online. Two of the four influent pumps are now rebuilt, and Staff will be installing additional valves at the end of this year or early next year.

Administrator Wallace added that the Primary Clarifier No. 1 project was a major project and that everything went well.

5. BOARD ACTION ON INDIVIDUAL ITEMS

A. RESOLUTION HONORING BILL NICOLLS FOR BOARD SERVICE

Administrator Wallace presented a resolution recognizing Mr. Bill Nicolls for his many dedicated years of District Board service.

Mr. Nicolls said that it was his pleasure serving on the Board. He said that the District has done a good job and continues to do a good job.

Director Ferrara said that he wanted to publicly thank Mr. Nicolls for Mr. Nicolls' work with the Board. Director Ferrara said that Mr. Nicolls has gone over every aspect of what the District does in great detail and is genuinely concerned with making the Plant a better place. He said that it has been a pleasure serving with Mr. Nicolls, and he appreciates all of the benefit which he has brought to the Board and to the District.

Administrator Wallace added his own thanks and appreciation on behalf of the District Staff for Mr. Nicolls' thoroughness and his participation in the process.

It was moved by Director Peterson, seconded by Director Ferrara to approve the staff recommendation that the Board adopt Resolution No. 2012-303 A Resolution Honoring Bill Nicolls for His Outstanding Board Service to the Citizens of the South San Luis Obispo County Sanitation District and on the following roll call vote to wit:

B. ADOPTION OF LOCAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN

Administrator Wallace presented the Staff recommendation that the Board receive and review the most recent revisions regarding flood hazard mitigations recently completed and incorporated into the draft Multi-Jurisdictional Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, and to adopt Resolution No. 2012-302, approving the Plan, and approve the attached commitment letter to the coordinating agency.

Director Ferrara spoke about the changes which had been made regarding the language in Objective 2. Director Peterson said that she feels like it does not give the District much to go on with regards to making the County handle flood mitigation. Director Ferrara said that it is worded about as strongly as a hazard mitigation plan could be. Mr. Dave Mathe said that the purpose is to allow the District to seek funding for pre-disaster mitigation and funding for flood mitigation. Director Peterson said that she would like to change the wording, to read to read: "Objective 2. Request the County of San Luis Obispo to..."

Under public comment, Mr. Jeff Edwards commented on the proposed mitigation actions

and suggested sending a letter to the County compelling the County to address flood mitigation.

It was moved by Director Peterson, seconded by Director Ferrara to approve the staff recommendation that the Board adopt Resolution No. 2012-302 A Resolution Adopting the 2013 Multi-Jurisdictional Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, as amended, and on the following roll call vote to wit:

C. BIOSOLIDS CONTAINMENT

Administrator Wallace spoke about the need to take interim measures for a biosolids containment project. The District had been served with a Notice of Violation (NOV) on December 18, 2012 from the Regional Water Quality Control Board, a part of which referred to an EPA CEI report that stated that there may be a potential for groundwater contamination from the biosolids storage area. Immediately upon receiving the EPA report, Staff began to address the problem and improvements are underway. These further actions will allow Staff to finalize an interim measure for containing the biosolids.

Plant Superintendent Barlogio presented the pros and cons of each of the four alternatives for biosolids containment and recommended that renting a dump trunk, in the short term, would make the most sense.

Under public comment, Mr. Jeff Edwards commented on the situation given the District's new centrifuge.

Mr. Jeff Pienak of Oceano asked that the District set aside funds for the permanent improvements to the biosolids storage area.

Mr. Dave Broadwater commented that he was pleased that the biosolids will be off the ground.

It was moved by Director Peterson, seconded by Director Ferrara, to approve the staff recommendation that the Board approve the first option for biosolids containment as presented in the Staff report which is the renting of a dump truck from a commercial vendor for approximately \$1,900 per month. Motion carried unanimously.

D. LAFCO SPECIAL DISTRICT MEMBER ELECTION

Administrator Wallace requested the Board vote for one of the candidates for the LAFCO Special District position. This position is currently filled by Muril Clift of the Cambria CSD.

It was moved by Director Peterson, seconded by Director Ferrara, to cast the

District's vote in favor of Muril Clift of the Cambria CSD for the Special District position on the Local Agency Formation Commission. Motion carried unanimously.

E. CHEMICAL PUMP PURCHASE

Plant Superintendent Barlogio requested the purchase of a chemical pump in case of pump failure. The new pump would be of a different type which has been used successfully in the past. This would be a sole source purchase from D&H Water Systems as the sole distributor for these pumps in this area..

It was moved by Director Ferrara, seconded by Director Peterson, to approve the staff recommendation that the Board approve the sole-source purchase of a chemical feed pump, model Blue-White M-4, from D&H Water Systems in the amount of \$5,836.50. Motion carried unanimously.

F. FEASIBILITY ANALYSIS OF ELECTRICAL SYSTEM

Administrator Wallace presented the Staff recommendation to have a feasibility analysis and evaluation of the electrical system performed. This would result in the placing of two of the four influent pumps on one breaker and the other two influent pumps on another breaker.

Under public comment, Ms. Julie Tacker said that consultants other than those from Thoma Electric should be used.

It was moved by Director Peterson, seconded by Director Ferrara, to approve the staff recommendation that the Board approve an agreement with Thoma Electric to conduct a feasibility analysis and evaluation of the electrical distribution and proposal to revise the electrical distribution system feeding the four influent pumps, not to exceed \$7,500. Motion carried unanimously.

G. CHLORINATION FAILURE ALARM

Plant Superintendent Barlogio said that Staff would like to install an alarm system for the disinfection system so that, in an event of a failure, operations staff could be immediately notified of the problem.

Under public comment, Tom Geaslen, General Manager of the OCSD, spoke about how his district now has an alarm system with auto-dialers which works well.

It was moved by Director Ferrara, seconded by Director Peterson, to approve the staff recommendation that the Board approve the installation of a low chlorine residual/chlorination failure alarm system and electrical components purchased by operations staff as necessary, in an amount not-to-exceed \$10,000. Motion carried unanimously.

The data I have as of the writing of this report is as follows;

Monthly average flow 2.47 million gallons per day BOD in 332 mg/l BOD out 14 mg/l, 95 % removal TSS in 466 mg/l TSS out 31 mg/l, 93 % removal Chlorine usage 294 lbs


Fecal coliform results one each of 2, 4, 8 and 13 mpn, and 14 results less than 2 mpn, not detected


During the month of Dec 2012, staff accomplished the following;

Staff rented a dump truck to place the dewatered bio-solids from the centrifuge into the lined sludge drying bed.



Replaced the brushes on the Muffin Monster grinder's auger. To accomplish this, staff removed the auger from the headworks area to set the unit on stands near the shop. Staff then removed the old brushes. To install the new brushes, staff drilled holes in the metal portion of the auger, used pins to secure the brushes to the auger, and returned the unit to the headworks area. Staff called upon a crane truck to assist setting the auger back into it's place, and put unit back in service.









As part of the influent pump project, we have No. 1 influent pump in service after replacing the suction and discharge valves, replaced the check valve, installed a rebuilt rotating assembly, and wear ring. We will be going into the rainy season with two rebuilt pumps, and one good pump. Combined, they should have the ability to pump over 12 million gallon per day rate. Typically, the maximum daily flow does not exceed 5 million gallon rate.

Approve Progress Payment No. 2 to Ellison Environmental Inc. dba Fluid Resource Management, in the amount of \$124,957.65. (Net payment of \$112,461.88 with retention withheld.); approve change orders Nos. 2-7; direct staff to file a Notice of Completion and release the retention in the amount of \$17,416.25 if no liens have been filed in the statutory lien period.

Funding:

The FY 2012-13 Budget includes Major Budget Item 06 MBI 04 – *Primary Clarifier No. 1 Catwalk and Drive* – in the amount of \$213,384.00. As of December 19, 2012, and subsequent release of retainage, the following expenditures will have occurred:

\$44,287.37	Progress Payment No. (with retention withheld.)
\$112,461.88	Progress Payment No. 2 (with retention withheld)
\$17,416.25	Retainage from Progress Payments No. 1 and No. 2

Leaving a budget balance of \$35,759.20. It is anticipated that there will be project close out expenditures not to exceed \$5,000.

Discussion:

A contract with Ellison Environmental Inc. dba Fluid Resource Management (FRM) was approved by Board action on April 4, 2012 to perform coatings work, and to install a new Primary Clarifier drive unit and access bridge. The clarifier drive motor was previously purchased by the District and stored on-site for installation by FRM as part of this contract.

Progress Payment No. 1 along with Change Order No. 1 (CCO1) was approved by a Board Action on June 6, 2012 in the amount of \$44,284.37 (net of retention). Phase one consists of mobilization for coatings, draining, cleaning, sandblasting and coating the interior of the Clarifier tank.

Progress Payment No. 2 consists of the completion of the work including coating, installing and testing the new drive, and fabrication of and installing the new bridge. Contract Change Orders (CCOs) 2-4, 6 & 7 are also included at the costs listed in the table below. (Change Order No. 5 was eliminated.) A copy of the itemized progress payment is included as an attachment to this report.

CCO1 was previously approved for additional de-ragging and cleaning of the clarifier mechanism.

CCO2 was required due to a delay with the bridge fabricator and resulted in an extension of the contract completion date with no additional cost to the District. Staff determined CCO3 was required when the condition of the effluent pit was examined during phase 1 of the project. However, coating was not possible during the first phase of construction. CCO4 was required when operations staff added the sandblasting and coating of the scum pit. This will ensure all wear surfaces of the tank are sufficiently coated. CCO5 was a placeholder that was not needed. CCO6 was required due to unknown conditions that existed under the existing drive. Once the existing drive was removed, Staff determined that it was necessary for the long term operation of the Clarifier to clean, sandblast and coat the steel Dutchman that is an integral part of the drive support system. CCO7 was required due to unknown conditions of a steel member on the Clarifier arm that existed beneath the water surface and provided for the replacement of a support member on the scum skimmer arm.

A construction punch list was developed and all items have now been completed by the Contractor to the satisfaction of Staff.

Based upon the work that has been completed by the contractor, Staff believes this payment is equivalent to the amount of work performed during this period and the project is ready to be finalized.





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currently known as the California Association of Sanitation Agencies (CASA). Castro Valley, Central Contra Costa, Cupertino, Oro Loma, Stege, and Union

Sanitary Districts were instrumental in the development of the association.

In July 1961, the CASA Board also voted to change the name to California Sanitary and Sanitation Districts Association to reflect its broadened membership. In the mid-60s a Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) was established in each county and greatly reduced local agency jurisdictional conflict: the fears of conflicts between sanitation and sanitary districts never materialized. To the contrary, a full blend of the two types of districts was accomplished. The organization prospered significantly as the larger sanitation districts, including Orange County Sanitation District, County Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County, Ventura Regional Sanitation District, Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District, and East Bay Municipal Utility District became members. Member agencies by that time were responsible for the wastewater treatment of more than 50 percent of the population in California.

CASA's bylaws were amended in 1961 to allow membership by county sanitation districts. This move was greeted with trepidation by some of the sanitary districts because of the basic organizational differences between the two types of districts. Sanitary districts have elected boards, while the boards of directors for sanitation districts are comprised of members from county boards of supervisors and city councils. During the 1960s, the Legislature considered many proposals for the absorption of special districts by cities and, as a result, CASA was actively engaged in lobbying efforts to maintain the independence of its sanitary district membership.

Under the leadership of President Fred Harper (Orange County) and Past President Tom Hardcastle (Novato) CASA recognized the need for a paid legislative advocate and executive director to maintain an office in Sacramento. Appointed in 1961, Ken Norris was appointed CASA's first executive director. Ken served until his sudden death from a heart attack in 1973. Michael Dillon with Michael F. Dillon & Associates was selected to succeed Ken.

in the early 1970s, CASA's bylaws were again amended to expand eligibility to include any public agency authorized to collect, treat, or dispose of sewage and waste or to reclaim wastewater and our name was changed to California Association of Sanitation Agencies (CASA).

Also at that time, an informal advisory committee to the State Water Resources Control Board was formed representing CASA, the League of California Cities and the California Water Pollution Control Association. Originally, this committee, known as Tri-TAC, considered only matters relating to the Clean Water Grants Program. Later, its scope of interest expanded to include all water quality related matters.

As CASA gained experience and recognition at the state level, with the active guidance of its larger member districts, it began to extend its activities at the federal level. As a result, in 1985, CASA hired its first Washington, D.C.

legislative and legal issues.

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lobbyist, Eric Sapirstein, who continues to serve the association today. As both federal and state laws and regulations continued to impact member agencies, the CASA Executive Board met extensively in 1991 to review and chart goals for the future. In 1992, upon a recommendation of the Executive Board, the Council approved the hiring of a Director of Regulatory Affairs. After an extensive search, Roberta (Bobbi) L. Larson was hired as CASA's Director of Regulatory Affairs in 1992. Under her leadership, the Air, Land and Water Technical Committees were established and are chaired by CASA agency member expert staff. The committees interface with Tri-TAC, and all CASA member agencies have benefited from the work of these committees. In 1999, Larson, earned her law degree, returned to CASA as Director of Legal and Regulatory Affairs.

Entering the 21st Century, CASA's leadership role in the wastewater industry continued to grow. As a result, CASA staff responsibilities increased to meet changing demands, membership growth, development of CASA's website, and on-line registration for conferences. In 2001, municipalities became equal partners as the General Council unanimously approved an amendment to the bylaws enabling full membership of cities. With new city membership, CASA's influence grew instantly, and the addition of membership from the largest cities brought the sewered population served by CASA member agencies to 90 percent. A 2001 bylaw change added an Associate representative a full voting member of the Executive Board.

In May 2003, the Executive Board, with the approval of the General Council, established a biosolids program to address the ever-increasing need of biosolids management, education and outreach.

CASA held its first Washington, D.C. Conference in 2004. CASA now meets annually in Washington to further strengthen its legislative and regulatory voice with policymakers regarding key federal issues.

On January 6, 2005, leaders of the five state and regional wastewater associations met in Sacramento to explore opportunities for working together on issues of critical importance to their collective memberships. The group known as the 'Clean Water Summit Partners' continue to meet each quarter in Sacramento. The Summit focuses on topics of mutual concern and opportunities for common efforts. In addition to CASA, Summit partners include: Bay Area Clean Water Association; California Water Environment Association; Central Valley Clean Water Association; and Southern California Alliance of Publicly Owned Treatment Plants.

In 2000, the Executive Board adopted a new five-year strategic plan including the recruitment for a new executive director. In spring 2006, Catherine Smith was selected to serve as the CASA Executive Director.

CASA continues to broaden its activities and services to meet the needs of its membership – large and small districts, associate members, and cities. CASA is viewed and accepted as a trustworthy source of information at the federal level by the EPA, the state level by the SWRCB, and at the local level by the regional boards. CASA has been able to attract outstanding persons in the field of water quality to share their expertise, knowledge, and insight with the organization at its conferences. As CASA's influence has grown, so has the number of associate members – engineering consultants, accountants, attorneys, and financial institutions – active in the field of water quality. This body of expertise is readily available to CASA members through their participation in the organization's activities. Members seeking formal professional services can draw upon this valuable resource.

A key to CASA's success has been the internal structure and balance of the organization. CASA's leadership comes from a combination of public officials, attorneys, and professional staff making it one of the preeminent wastewater associations in the United States.
